

EPIPHANY AND THE PURSUIT OF WISDOM

Tomorrow is the Christian festival of Epiphany, which is celebrated in many and various ways by Christians around the world. It celebrates the revelation of Jesus to the world, primarily via the visit of the Magi. The Magi were renowned for their wisdom, tenacity and astronomical understanding. It's likely that they travelled over a thousand miles, from the Persian Empire, centred in modern-day Iran, to Israel. There in the stables, next to an inn in Bethlehem, they presented their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. In so doing, they affirmed and foreshadowed Jesus' roles as king, priest and prophet.

There are 219 references in the Bible to wisdom, many of which are attributable to King Solomon, in the Old Testament books of Proverbs and Ecclesiastes, long before the time of the Magi. Solomon's reign was a golden age of unparalleled peace and prosperity, where Israel enjoyed security from enemies, abundant resources, and flourishing trade, allowing for significant building projects and cultural growth.

How we need wisdom, peace and prosperity in our world today! The Magi provide us with the answer; their spiritual pursuit led them to worship Jesus, the Prince of Peace. Following in their footsteps, worship and adoration in our Church schools can become doorways to encountering Jesus by his Spirit. It is in this context of spiritual encounter that we can really discover life in all its fulness. Experiencing the love of God in all its fulness, the very life of God, and learning how to express this in selfless and sacrificial ways to others, is of paramount importance for our flourishing together in 2026 and beyond.

REMEMBERING RACHAEL HUTCHINSON 22nd December 1959 – 2nd December 2025

Many of us gathered at St Mary Magdalene Church in Brampton last Monday to give thanks for the life of Rachael Hutchinson. Rachael's sunny, warm, calm and optimistic personality shone through her work as Headteacher of All Saints CE Primary School in Peterborough, and latterly as a Diocesan Schools Consultant and SIAMS Inspector. She was a much-loved mother, grandmother, sister, aunt, cousin and friend to many. We will miss Rachael enormously and give thanks to God for her inspiring life. She loved the Saviour whom she served devotedly and is now at peace in His presence. Remarkably, Rachael chose the songs for her funeral whilst still in hospital and nearing the end of life in this world. The songs she chose included lyrics with recurring themes about peace, comfort and hope, such as:

*'Drop Thy still dews of quietness
Till all our strivings cease
Take from our souls the strain and stress,
And let our ordered lives confess
The beauty of Thy peace'*

*'Pardon for sin and a peace that endureth,
Thine own dear presence to cheer and to guide;
Strength for today and bright hope for tomorrow,
Blessings all mine, with ten thousand beside!'*

HEADTEACHERS' CONFERENCE – TEACHING AND LEARNING: COACHING AND PROFESSIONAL LEARNING, WITH TOM SHERRINGTON – THURSDAY 19TH MARCH

Tom Sherrington will be our speaker for the day, leading us through the following sessions.

Instructional Teaching, Generative Learning and The MARGE Model

Tom will explore some fundamental ideas about learning, including Fiorella and Mayer's generative learning principles and Shimamura's MARGE model. These inform the nature of great teaching - which is highly interactive and strongly generative, with every learner thinking, making meaning and practising.

A deep dive on questioning, from cold calling to whole class discussion

Tom will explore how some core ideas about questioning can support teachers to ensure that every single student is involved in answering every question, in structured pair talk and in a whole class discussion. It will be a practical session, where the techniques will be acted out and discussed, from the point of view of delivering excellent training, focusing on precision and clarity of purpose.

Coaching with 'WalkThrus' (part 1)

The 'WalkThrus' Coaching book, published in September 2025, sets out a framework for supporting teachers one to one, in pairs or in larger groups following a clear set of protocols. We will look in detail at the Bambrick-Santoyo 5Ps approach and explore the nature of an effective feedback conversation. We will also revisit the elements of strong school systems that enable coaching to play a key role in improving teaching and learning.

Coaching with 'WalkThrus' (part 2)

Tom will continue to take us through all the various kinds of WalkThrus he would recommend, illustrating how they can be used to support effective coaching and support strong school systems.
