Crime and Policing Bill - NSPCC

The Crime and Policing Bill will introduce a new statutory duty for people in key roles to report child sexual abuse when they are made aware of it. This new duty will implement one of the key recommendations from the [Independent Inquiry into Child Sexual Abuse \(IICSA\)](#).

The NSPCC have produced free recorded webinars about the proposed duty that explore:

- the story so far and what's happening now
- who the new duty will apply to
- what you should report
- what stops children speaking out
- the process for reporting
- survivor stories and what we've learnt

The UK Safer Internet Centre has announced its theme for this year's Safer Internet Day coming up in February. We've covered the Safer Internet Day over the past few years and it remains an excellent initiative. The project launched in 2004 by the EU Safer Borders organisation, is aimed at mutual learning and connecting over current issues in internet security. Each year the event gets bigger and bigger and this year their chosen theme is 'smart tech, safe choices and exploring AI and its responsible use.' an exponential rate, it is important that they have the skills and knowledge to make choices when using said programmes. Question of the Week

Question

“If a child discloses something worrying to you, what are the two most important things you must (and must not) do in that moment?”

Here's one answer, what's wrong with it?

"I'd reassure the child and promise to keep what they say secret so they don't lose trust in me. Then I'd ask lots of questions to get all the details and jot down the main points before deciding whether it's serious enough to tell the DSL later."

Answer

Never promise secrecy

You must never promise confidentiality. You must explain that you will need to share the concern with the DSL to help keep the child safe.

Don't ask lots of questions

We are not investigators. You should only listen and, if necessary, ask a simple clarifying question. Asking too many questions risks confusing or muddling the child's account.

Don't summarise 'main points'

Don't rewrite in your own words. Record factually, as soon as possible, using the child's exact words.

Don't consider the seriousness yourself or delay reporting

It's not your role to judge whether it's "serious enough". Always pass it on to the DSL immediately using the school's procedures.

Correct Approach

- Listen, reassure, explain (you must share with the DSL).
- Record in the child's words.
- Report immediately to the DSL.

Children in Gangs - LSCB

In safeguarding we often talk about gangs and gang involvement, but what do we actually mean by “gangs,” and when should we be worried? The Lambeth Safeguarding Children Board has a clear and practical article that explains why adolescents may be drawn to gangs, the risks involved, how to recognise the signs, and where to seek help.

Key points to be aware of include:

- Gangs often thrive on secrecy, making involvement difficult to detect.
- Adolescents may be attracted by a sense of belonging or control.
- The risks include criminal activity, violence, and exploitation.
- Warning signs can include changes in behaviour, peer groups, or appearance.
